

An act
to divide the township of Cinnaminson, in the County of Burlington, into two townships.

Whereas,

The inhabitants of the township of Cinnaminson, in the County of Burlington, have become so numerous that it is impracticable for them to meet and transact the township business at their annual and other town meetings, with convenience and good order, in one assembly, for remedy whereof:

Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the township of Cinnaminson, in the County of Burlington, shall be and the same is hereby divided into two townships, in the following manner, that is to say: all that part of said township west of a line running from Charles Haines' flood-gates by the Delaware river in a South-Eastern direction (parallel with the public road leading from Taylor's station, on the Camden and Amboy railroad to New Albany) in a straight line to the northern boundary line of the township of Chester, shall constitute and be known as the township of Cinnaminson; and all that part lying east of said line shall constitute and be known as the township of Delran.

And be it enacted, That the inhabitants of the township of Cinnaminson are a body politic and corporate in law, and shall be styled and known by the name of "The inhabitants of the township of Cinnaminson, in the County of Burlington," and shall

be entitled to all rights, power, authority, privileges and advantages, and subject to the same regulations, government and liabilities, as the inhabitants of the other townships in the said county of Burlington are or may be entitled or subjected to by existing laws of this state.

3. And be it enacted, That the inhabitants of the township of Delran are constituted a body politic and corporate in law, and shall be styled and known by the name of "The inhabitants of the township of Delran, in the County of Burlington" and shall be entitled to all the rights, powers, authority, privileges and advantages, and subject to the same regulations, government, and liabilities, as the inhabitants of the other townships in said county of Burlington are or may be entitled or subjected to by existing laws of this state.

4. And be it enacted, That the inhabitants of the township of Cinnaminson shall hold their next annual town greeting at Harris' Hall in the village of Westfield in said township, on the second Tuesday of March next.

5. And be it enacted, That the inhabitants of the township of Delran shall hold their first town greeting at the town house in said township on the second Tuesday of March next.

6. And be it enacted, That the town Committees of the townships of Cinnaminson and Delran shall meet on the Monday next after the annual town meetings in the said townships of Cinnaminson and Delran at the town house in the township of Delran aforesaid, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, and then and there pro-

by writing, signed by a majority of those present, to allot and divide between the said townships all properties and moneys on hand or due, in proportion to the taxable property and estates, as taxed by the assessors within their respective limits at the last assessment; and the inhabitants of the township of Cinnaminson and the inhabitants of the township of Delran, shall be liable and required to pay their just proportion of the debts, respectively, if any there be; and receive their just proportion of all property, if any there be; and if any of the persons comprising either of the township committees should neglect or refuse to meet as aforesaid, those assembled may proceed to make the division and the division of a majority of those present shall be final and conclusive.

And be it enacted

That it shall be so construed to impair, or in any wise affect the rights of the said township of Delran in and to its just and legal portion of the surplus revenue of the general government, and to the interest due or becoming due thereon.

8.

And be it enacted

That the township of Delran shall form part of the Second assembly district of the County of Burlington, as heretofore, when included within the township of Cinnaminson.

9.

And be it enacted

That this act shall take effect immediately.

Passed February 12-1880.

Pursuant to the fifth section of the
Act "to divide the Township of Cinnaminson
in the County of Burlington into two
Townships"; the first Town Meeting for Del-
aware Township was held in the Town House
in said Township, March 9th 1880 -
Robert W. Babington was chosen Moderator
and Edward S. Hunter Secretary -

A motion of Darling Connor to read
the proceedings of the Township for the past
year was agreed to -

A motion of Wallace Lippincott that
the report be received and referred to the
Joint Committee was agreed to.

The Annual Report of the Chosen Free-
holder, was read and accepted.

A motion of Darling Connor that one
Thousand Dollars be raised for Township
purposes was agreed to.

A motion of Wallace Lippincott that
the Township Committee appoint a
Physician, who shall be a resident of
the Township was agreed to.

A motion of the same that the Town Physician
receive a Salary of Twenty Five Dol-
lars per year was agreed to.

X A motion of Robert D. Brock that the
Committee elect, recommend the sale of
the Town Hall was agreed to.

Wallace Lippincott reported that he had
never given Cinnaminson Township a Deed
for the piece of ground used as a burying
ground for paupers, and that if Eldon
Township would pay for the Deed, he would
have it prepared giving it to said Township.

agreed, that, the Potters Field be accepted
for the cost of the Deed -

A motion of Charles Hammell that a vote of
thanks be tendered Wallace Leppincott for
presenting the Township with the Potters Field
was agreed to -

A motion of Wallace Leppincott that the
Township Committee receive Fifteen Dollars
per year for services was agreed to -

A motion of Robert M. Brock that the Town-
ship Committee be authorized to employ
Counsel, if necessary, at a salary of Ten
dollars per year, and that all disbursements
made by Said Counsel be recorded in a
book to be preserved for future use of the
Township was agreed to.

A motion of the same that the Freeholder
be instructed to vote against any measure
that may come up in the meetings of the
Board of Freeholders, having for its object the
sending of any Children to the Childrens Home at
Mount Holly, there to be provided for at the ex-
-pense of the County, was agreed to.

Dr. John C. Purcell was elected Township Physician at a salary of Twenty Five dollars (\$25⁰⁰) per year, including service and medicine.

Ten Thousand dollars (\$10,000⁰⁰), was fixed as the amount of Security that would be required of the Township Treasurer.

The Overseer of the Roads was requested to put One Hundred and Fifty dollars (\$150⁰⁰) worth of work on the road from Robert P. Gar.

Members all present.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The Treasurer's Bond was presented, read and approved -

Robert P. Garwood reported that he had received the resignation of Edward S. Hunter as Collector March 30th last - and at an informal meeting of the Committee, members all present, held the same day it had been received and Robert M. Brock had been elected Township Collector -

The Collector's Bond was presented, read and approved -

Dr. John C. Parrelli's letter of acceptance as Township Physician, was presented, read and accepted -

Tom. H. Hubbs bill for Six dollars (\$6.00) for relief granted to Mary Sundermire was presented - but as there was no money in hand, no action was taken on it.

On motion the Overseer of Roads was directed to clear up the Road, and fill up the holes therin, on both sides of and adjacent to the bridge in front of Washington Hunter's - on the Riverside and Cambridge Road.

On motion it was decided to instruct the Overseer to gravel the Moorestown Road from the Mill, to Chester Township Line -

to request Wallace Sippincott to give up
the Deed for the Potter's Field, as per agree-
ment -

Robert F. Garwood was directed to write to
the Overseer of Poor, and instruct him to live
strictly up to the letter of the Law hereafter,
before granting relief to the Poor of the Township.

directed to pass balance of all School monies

Sale by the joint Township Committees Jan 5th 1881

Clayton Conrow produced the Deed for the transfer of the Real Estate which was examined by the balance of the Committee, approved, signed, acknowledged and given to Isaac Evaul as Treasurer for safe keeping until the purchase money should be paid.

The note in Bank for \$1000.00 falling due the third of next month - The Treasurer reported \$326.57 on hand which with \$365⁷⁷ due to morrow for the Town House property would make \$691.59 balance needed \$308.41 which being offered by Edward H. Ogden was accepted and a joint note given payable in six months.

Upon Motion of E. H. Ogden, Howard Parry was directed to have the sale advertised in The Mount Holly Herald for the consecutive six

The Joint Township Committee met in the old Connaminson Town Hall on Saturday November 20 - 1880 - Members all present -

The Conditions of an old Tax Sale as originally written by Chas. E. Hendrickson of Mount Holly were read and upon Motion when changed to suit were adopted as the Conditions of the Sale for Taxes about to be commenced -

Upon Motion it was decided to divide taxes of \$25⁴¹/₁₀₀ due on Elizabeth Smith's properties in ^{assessed as one} Riverside, equally between the two properties.

The List was then revised, the names of all parties stricken off who had paid their Taxes in full since its first publication and the Sale proceeded with - amounting to \$315⁹²/₁₀₀.

The Committee then adjourned to the New Albany School House to issue Certificates of Sale etc - after which adjourned to meet at Bridgeboro Hotel on Monday next 22nd. inst at One O'clock P.M.

Mr. B. Wills bill of \$77⁶⁵ - for advertising Tax Sale of Nov. 20 last in "The Mount Holly Herald" also for printing slips and Deeds was received - The Deeds not having come to hand On motion the bill was unpaid laid on the table until they were received -

After carefully looking over the accounts to the best of their ability the Committees were united in believing that George B. Johnson had overdrawn School monies laying in his hands to pay Township debts worth to the amount of \$216⁵². And that the Township owed him that amount of Money -

Upon Motion of Darling Conrow that amount was ordered refunded to him.

Mahlon Sharp was paid one Dollar for the use of the room, light, etc. for to day's meeting
